

This is an exciting year as the delayed anniversary conference of the Vaughan Association will be held in Brecon, 5th-8th May. They will visit Henry Vaughan's grave for the annual wreath laying ceremony at Llansantffraed Church on Saturday 7th May and also come to the Garden. Trees and roses have been pruned and beds and labels tidied in readiness, and BBNP and locals are working on the entrance at the uphill boundary.

The Queen's Green Canopy - A Celebration for the **Platinum Jubilee**

Trees have always been important to us and over the years we have been very lucky to have the opportunity to plant many. We heard about plans for woods to be planted across the U.K. to mark the unique achievement of HM the Queen in reaching this amazing milestone. So we approached members of the Community Council to see if this could become a part of the community's celebration, for everyone to use and enjoy over the coming years -



our contribution to the Queen's Green Canopy initiative.

We chose a site on one of our fields nearest to the village where there is already a Public Footpath, not far from the Henry Vaughan Walk, and with wonderful open views of the magnificent surrounding countryside and hills. We are very grateful to Glasnant and Huw Morgan for allowing us to use one of the few flat and best bits of pasture on the farm! During the next few months, we will enclose the area and provide details of where it is, so that you can see the project beginning to take shape.

We were delighted that the community group involved in organizing the Platinum Jubilee celebrations were very enthusiastic and supportive about our idea and, working with us, have successfully put in an application to the Woodland Trust. The Woodland Trust will now donate 195 trees which will include Wild Cherry, Birch and Rowan. The community group have also generously offered to provide funding from the National Lottery Jubilee Celebration Grant for a bench to be sited within the wood, so that everyone can come at any time to enjoy the trees as they grow. We hope very much that anyone who wants to, can be involved in the planting which is planned for next November.

Watch this space, Facebook and Henderson Hall website for further details as they emerge.

In addition, the Welsh Assembly is offering to give each household in Wales a tree to mark the occasion through the Woodland Trust: "My Tree, Our Forest project - Plant a tree for the Jubilee". Some of you might like to plant your tree in the small wood and arrangements are being made to try to make this possible. Again, further details will be provided once the timing of this is confirmed.

In these current troubled times, we hope that this project will bring a little of that hope for the future which always comes with planting trees. For us, the joy of watching trees grow and mature year by year is very positive and we hope that all members of our community, and especially those of you with young children, will be able to share in this simple pleasure.

There will be a concert given by the Gwent Chamber Orchestra at Llanfeugan Church, Pencelli, on the 19th of June at 3pm. Tickets (£10) are available from Julia Watkins (01874 676085) or at the door. The Orchestra is grateful for the help of Hilary and Simon Baldwin in organising this concert.

The programme will include works by Handel. Telemann and Vivaldi and will feature several local performers. Lowri Probert (soprano) will sing music by Handel as well as popular Italian and Welsh airs. She will be joined by Glasnant Morgan in a Welsh song and Glasnant will also give brief readings from the story of Don Quixote when the orchestra performs the suite, Don Quixote by the baroque composer, Telemann. Lowri has just completed her vocal studies at the Royal Northern College of Music in Manchester and will next year take up a scholarship at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama in London. Glasnant's fine voice been heard many times on has Christmas Eve, leading the singing at

the Talybont Village Nativity Procession. The other local soloist will be Julia Watkins who will take the first solo violin part in Vivaldi's Concerto for four Violins and Julia's husband, Stephen Broom will conduct the concert.

The Gwent Chamber Orchestra was founded in 1975 by David Gedge, organist and choirmaster at Brecon Cathedral and apart from one brief period (2012-2015) has been in existence to the present day. In 2014 Julia, a member of the orchestra since its early days and originally from Brynmawr, came to live in Talybont following many years living and working as a violinist in London. After meeting up with several original members of the orchestra it was decided to restart the group with Julia leading the players and Stephen conducting. Stephen, originally from Pontypridd, has been a viola player with several major orchestras most notably as principal viola for twenty years with the Orchestra of the Royal Opera House. The Gwent Chamber Orchestra has a mixture of professional, semi-professional and gifted amateur players and performs mainly in the Gwent, Brecon and Welsh borders area.

0000000 PLANTING FOR THE QUEEN'S JUBILEE



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I have been asked by a member of the Queen's Jubilee Committee to suggest a few colourful planting schemes in red, white and blue so here are a few suggestions: For producing a colourful bedding display try planting red GERANIUMS with white PETUNIAS and an edging of blue LOBELIA. Another suggestion would be to use red SALVIA with blue HELIOTROPE and a border edging of white ALYSSUM

If your choice is to use only one type of bedding plant you might like to consider searching for plug plants of VERBENA (UNION JACK mixed) in red, white and blue shades or PETUNIA (STARS

AND STRIPES) or (FROST mixed) again in red, white and blue.

There are a number of choices for patio containers. Again, red GERANIUMS would be popular, planted up with SURFINIA PETUNIAS (WHITE, BLOOD RED and SKY BLUE shades) Apart from the petunias there are other types for producing a cascade of colour such as trailing LOBELIA (MONSOON or SAPPHIRE), BACOPA in white and blue shades and trailing FUCHSIAS in red, blue and white colours.





Most of the plants listed are annuals but you might prefer to plant up a container with perennials. If so you could use SALVIA (HOT LIPS), white OSTEOSPERMUM and the hardy blue GERANIUM (ROZANNE) to trail around the edges.

A planting scheme to attract insect pollinators would be COSMOS in red and white shades, single red POPPIES, blue CORNFLOWERS and white OX-EYE DAISIES.

Most of the annuals and perennials listed are obtainable as plug plants from mail order companies like THOMPSON and MORGAN, VAN MEUWEN OR WOOLMANS so start searching and see 💋 what colourful schemes you can come up with for the Queen's Jubilee. Gareth Davies



It was good to have Llandetty Church open for the first time in over two years for a service on Easter Day. To date, Llansantffraed Church is still closed, although we do hope to have it open for people to visit at 3pm on Saturday 7th May, for the annual Wreath Laying at the grave of Henry Vaughan, as part of the Vaughan Association Conference which is taking place that weekend.

Both Llandetty and Llansantffraed Churches are in difficulty as they each currently have no churchwardens or treasurers and very few members. Inevitably this does raise difficult questions about the potential future of these churches. However, it is important that any decisions about their future are not made rashly nor with undue haste. It's also important that the views, feelings and ideas of the wider communities which these churches have served over the centuries are taken into account. With the help of the Archdeacon we plan to hold a meeting - **7-30pm on Friday I**st July at the Henderson Hall, Talybont - at which these things might be considered. Craig had quite a haul from the Dram Road and in the vicinity of the Star Inn, and Mike Smith found a lot of cans and bottles in the hedgerows towards Ashford Tunnel. We had a new team member Hayley and her daughter Jo who were also dog-sitting and brought her along as an extra 4 legged helper and they checked out the car park and the immediate hall area. Mike & Clare did their usual route up to Cross Oak via Cui, and Anne & Tim checked out the canal towpath to Cross Oak and back; Colin Parry did his patch up to Aber Village and along the reservoir dam wall, Linda & Mark picked the tennis court end of the playing field, Penpentre & the OAP bungalows. Linda and Hayley both noticed some metal bits and pieces and doors which appeared to have been left over from the dregs of the bonfire and had been dumped up onto the old cycle track but Linda very kindly offered to drive over and retrieve all the left overs and dispose of them during that week - thank you Linda for offering to do this. Maesmawr Lane, Maesmawr Close and the cutting through to Station Road as well as the Orchard Trail were also done the following week, which means that all the immediate village areas had been thoroughly covered.

I stayed in the vicinity of the hall car park/recycling bins and discovered a large amount of

something quite nasty behind the recycling bins which I was unable to remove! Talybont-on-Usk Community Council

Elections will be held on May 5th for the Community Council. You will be able to vote for the Community Councillors who will serve you on the Community Council for the forthcoming term. The Polling Station is located in Henderson Hall.

Community Councillors have met with your Senedd Members, Jane Dodds, James Evans and The Canal and River Trust Senior representatives to discuss a number of issues impacting on the community along the canal towpath and bridges from Pencelli to Landetty. This was an extremely productive meeting resulting in a positive action plan for improvements.

Floodlights have been installed by the Community Council at the far end of the playing field at the tennis and football courts so that games can be enjoyed into the evening.

The Community Council have purchased 2 mobile speed units that will be installed by Powys County Council. There are 4 locations between Station Road and Pencelli where they will be sited. The mobile speed units will

then be moved around the 4 locations.

TALYBONT COMMUNITY FIBRE BROADBAND PROJECT

We are trying to get superfast fibre broadband for Talybont. There is a government scheme offering free installation of the fibre optic cables right to your home. Our neighbouring communities around Crickhowell, Llangorse, Erwood, Llangyndir etc. have all either already done this or are midway through their own projects. We don't want to be left out!

There was a bit of a panic as the Welsh government announced that the funding would end on March 31st, so we did a big leaflet drop in March to

publicise the project. The Welsh government then slightly backtracked on that, so although they won't fund new projects, they are allowing people to apply to join existing projects up until the new deadline of September. Luckily, local company Beacons Telecom had already put in an application for the village, so we now have until September for anyone who is interested to join.

Why join? If you want faster, better internet then this is for you. If you are a homeowner, it will increase the value of your house. If you have children or grandchildren living with you or visiting, they will expect superfast broadband.

Also, copper wires and landline telephones are going to be phased out, so if we want to remain connected, we will need fibre optic in the future.

Most importantly, **it is free!** The government is paying to instal the cable to your home. All you would pay is the ongoing internet or phone bill, exactly as you do right now. So it is a "no-brainer" as they say!

We've had 44 people express an interest and 27 have signed up for the government vouchers, but we need more than this otherwise the project won't go ahead. Beacons Telecom is a company and they won't build the fibre optic network if they lose money doing so. Please do speak to your friends and neighbours to spread the word.

At the moment, the project only covers Talybont and Aber. Hopefully, there will be other schemes available in the future for the other villages in the community.



The old Llansantffraed Junction

This photograph shows the 'London to Fishguard Highway' next to the 17th Century St Bride's Church in Llansantffraed. The church visible through the trees was replaced by the present St Bride's in 1885. The Gwynne-Holford sarcophagus, dating from the 1840s, is also visible. The highway curves left to cross a bridge over the Brecon and Merthyr Railway, opened in 1863. A trace of the highway is now formed by the long lay-by past the Old Rectory (previously Rock Cottage). The track-bed of the railway is now the flat straight of the A40 towards Newton Farm

The photograph was almost certainly taken by the one-time iron master Robert Thompson Crayshay (inset). He was known 'The Iron King'. He lived in Cyfartha Castle in Merthyr Tydfil. He suffered a stroke in 1860 that left him profoundly deaf. With the advent of photography he took up that pastime most enthusiastically. He took many photographs of the the Usk and Taff Valleys some of which are preserved in



the National Museum of Wales. He may be the bearded gentleman in the white hat. He died in 1879 at the age of 62.
